Spring has finally arrived and the time has come to get all boats ready for another fishing season. Always make sure your boat has the proper safety equipment on board and your motors are tuned up. It is also important that you always give someone your fishing trip plan so someone knows how long you will be on the water and when you are expected to return.

Thanks to all that participated in our off-season club events. We had a great turn-out for our annual awards banquet. Congratulations to all the winners in our club contests and we would like to wish everyone the best of luck this season. We also had a record attendance at our swap meet. Many great bargains were found, and it was a good time to stock up on some new equipment to try out this summer. 
Our next event is our annual "Ride a Charter Boat Day" scheduled for 6:00 pm Tuesday May 19th. It's hard to believe our club has been doing this for the public for 11 years now. Free boat rides and a variety of salmon recipes will be available along the boardwalk originating from the Wharf. This is a great hands on event provided by the generosity of many of our club member charter captains and organized by Jim Schlegel. I hope everyone has a chance to participate. We will also be presenting our donation checks with the local media that evening. If weather permits, we plan to film the event with the use of a camera equipped drone.

During one of our recent club meetings, we had Jerry Fetterer as our speaker talking about bait rigs. Bait rigs have been used on the west coast for quite a while. Jerry indicated that he fishes with bait rigs on a regular basis, and emphasized that things have changed from the past, such as new colors, utilizing different flashers and methods. Jerry likes to use UV flashers and changes colors quite often. With some of the new meat rigs, you can also change the size and color of the bait holder head. Herring is the preferred bait, and the key is to store it in a brine mixture. The bait works best if it is stiff from the brine mixture, as the bait has to be bent slightly so it rolls when being trolled. Large flashers (11") are preferred. Some people prefer the spin doctors, while others like the standard flashers. Long leads behind both types of flashers should be used; 42" and longer from the flasher to the bait. Jerry has found that meat rigs catch fish when the bite is tough. Most tournament anglers pull at least one meat rig, which results in bigger fish being caught. Jeff Brown also showed us some new rigs that have interchangeable heads and colors. Jerry likes to pull them on divers or copper lines on boards. Downriggers are less effective. Thanks to Jerry for the lesson on bait rigs.

Hopefully, everyone will have better success in catching fish when utilizing Jerry's above referenced techniques.

2015 Fish Net Pen Projects in WI - Per Email from Brad Eggold

We wanted to give you an update on net pen plans for 2015 (we are referring to pens used hold fish for more than 48 hours and/or rear & feed fish). There has been some recent information communicated to certain ports but we wanted to get some more details out to you. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has recently shared some results of the Coded Wire Tag (CWT) study or mass marking study with us. We have some very useful information that will help us with management decisions. There are a lot of details and we will be working on getting these results to you at various meetings and will put some information on our website soon. Relative to net pens, we have return rates for Chinook salmon based on where they were stocked in Lake Michigan and Huron. The general pattern is that Chinook salmon stocked in Wisconsin waters of Lake Michigan from Sturgeon Bay south to Kenosha County have very good survival and returns to the creel—this is very good news and means that current stocking techniques are working well and substantially contributing to the fishery (anglers are eventually catching the Wisconsin stocked chinook). Based on this information, we want to take a cautious approach to net pen use in Wisconsin.

Net Pen Study: Racine and Kewaunee angler groups will both be implementing net pens for Chinook salmon. These two rivers will be part of a research project to determine whether net pens increase returns or survival. All net pen fish in these two rivers will have the same coded wire tag batch code. The non-net pen fish for these rivers will be marked with a different batch code. When these fish return to the fishery and the weirs in those 2 rivers, we will be able to examine the tags to determine the ratios in which they are returning. If the net pen fish return at significantly higher rates than non-net pen fish, we can conclud that the pens are improving returns. If not, we will be able to conclude otherwise (either no effect or a negative effect). This research project is an essential step in determining what our future management should be—mainly, should we go forward with increased net pen use or not.

Stocking locations with a demonstrated return issue: Based on recent CWT results, chinook salmon stocked in both Menominee River and northern Door County are not surviving very well and not showing up in angler catches very well. These two locations are in clear need of a modification in management approach. Sport clubs will use net pens at both locations this spring. Hopefully, net pens will help survival and returns in northern Green Bay.

Other locations: Based on recent coded wire tag results, all other Wisconsin locations have demonstrated relatively high survival rates and are showing up in anglers' catches in many Lake Michigan locations. We do not know why Wisconsin stocked fish are surviving and returning at higher rates. In addition, we only have a few years' worth of coded wire tag return data. However, at this point we do not want to drastically alter our stocking strategies given they are currently working very well. Therefore, net pens projects at all other locations will be considered on a case-by-case basis. For example, a net pen project in Port Washington was already in development for Spring 2015 and will continue.

In summary, for the 2015 season, net pen projects will proceed in the Menominee River, Gills Rock, Kewaunee River, Port Washington and Racine. 

Club Donates \$500 to "Test the Waters Program"

Testing the Waters is a program for high school students that teach appreciation for the sciences, ecology, and the environment through hands-on experience. Area High Schools participate in two water testing days. One is performed in fall and the second in spring. After the spring testing day, the participating schools come together for a Spring Symposium. At the symposium, the schools analyze all their data and answer questions pertaining to the rivers tested. After a few years of diminished participation numbers due to limited funding, Testing the Waters is back in full force. This program has been in effect with Sheboygan County school districts over 11 years. Thankfully, with new partners such as Sheboygan River Basin Partnership, YMCA Camp Y-Koda, and Sheboygan Area Great Lakes Sport Fishermen, schools are once again able to participate in this exciting learning experience.
